









My working definition of vicarious (secondary) trauma here

A condition resulting from exposure to traumatic content indirectly, e.g. via screen.

(This may involve listening to / viewing accounts of eyewitnesses or hearing from victims of trauma and violence.)

Spotting the signs of (someone) being "unwell" ...

- Excessive use of drugs / alcohol ("substance abuse"), e.g. to forget (temporarily), have no bad dreams, to sleep, etc.
- Withdrawal from social activities or engagement with colleagues
- Being increasingly introvert
- Feelings of detachment from other people
- Difficulty to relate to mundane / ordinary concerns of others
- Being short-tempered / easily irritable

• ...

Note of caution and advice: the above can be signs, but mustn't be. They can occur in both people who directly or indirectly witnessed potentially traumatising incidents. In any case: if you feel unsure about signs and symptoms, seek professional help or refer your colleagues / friends to experts!

Mitigating Viewer Impact from Disturbing Imagery using AI Filters: A User-Study

ABSTRACT
Exposure to disturbing imagery can significantly impact individuals, especially professionals who encounter such content as part of their work. This paper presents a user study, involving 107 participants, predominantly journalists and lumnar rights investigators, that explores the capability of Artificial Intelligence (AI)-based images (Biters to potentially mitigate the emotional impact of viewing such disturbing allowing and AI-based (Drawing, Colored Drawing, and Painting), and meadured their effectiveness in terms of conveying image information while reducing emotional distress. Our findings suggest that the AI-based Drawing style filter demonstrates the best performance, offering a promising solution for reducing negative feelings (30.38%) while preserving the interpretability of the image (97.19%). Despite the requirement for many professionals to eventually inspect the original images, participants suggested potential strategies for integrating AI filters into their worldflow, such as using AI filters as an initial, preparatory step before viewing the original image. Overall, this paper contributes to the development of a more ethically considerate and effective visual environment for professionals routinely engaging with potentially disturbing imagery. potentially disturbing imagery.

In the era of digital communication there is an exponential increase in media content, with potentially disturbing and traumatizing images becoming increasingly prevalent (Dubberley, Griffin, & Bal, 2015; Reid, 2014; Zeng, 2018). This issue holds particular significance for professions such as journalism and human rights investigation, where interactions with distressing visual content are occupational inevitabilities (Dubberley et al., 2015). Such graphic visuals frequently encapsulate scenes of violence, harm, and suffering, provoking emotions of worry, concern, or anxiety that can lead to secondary or vicarious trauma (Sarridis, Koutlis, Papadopoulou, & Papadopoulos, 2022; Shah, 2023; Zampoglou, Papadopoulos, Kompatsiaris, & Spangenberg, 2016). For instance, professionals may be required to inspect footage from conflict zones such as the war in Ukraine (Spangenberg, 2022), scenes from natural disasters, or horrific accidents. Thus, it is crucial to develop and employ solutions that can effectively mitigate the viewer's impact from such disturbing imagery.
